

College Planning: How to Get Started

Step 1: Get Started


Step 2: Make some basic decisions

Step 3: Enlist help

Who do you want to assist you in this process (parents, teachers, siblings, relatives, and friends)?

Step 4: Consult References and Websites

Use online college searches & resources. Visit the websites of the colleges that interest you. **EXPLORE NAVIANCE!**

Step 5: Talk

Discuss your goals and plans with your parents, teachers, and school counselor. They can provide helpful advice.

Step 6 and Step 7:

When available, visit with college representatives and schedule tours of college campuses. Many colleges provide virtual tours on their websites. **Sign up to meet with college representatives who visit Mount Sinai HS this Fall!**


Search for Colleges:

- Click on link to college (.edu) to view accurate tuition, room/board
- Click the to save the college to your "thinking about" list




2024 SAT Test Dates: DIGITAL Register at <u>www.collegeboard.org</u>

March 9th – Late Registration Passed May 4th – Register by April 19th June 1st – Register by May 16th August 24th October 5th November 2nd December 7th

2024 ACT Test Dates: Register at <u>www.act.org</u>

April 13th – Register by Mar 8th June 8th – Register by May 3rd July 13th – Register by June 7th * No testing centers in NY September 7th October 26th December 7th



The SAT has gone DIGITAL!

March is the first digital SAT exam following a very successful digital PSAT in the Fall and several digital AP Exams this past Spring!

Approved Testing Devices: You can run Bluebook[™] on a Windows or Mac device, an iPad. You cannot run Bluebook on a mobile phone. Your device must be able to connect to Wi-Fi. On test day, your device must be fully charged; it will need to stay on for 3–4 hours. We also recommend you bring your device's power cord or a portable charger, but you might not have access to an outlet.

Download the BLUEBOOK APP: ASAP to practice and become familiar with its features prior to test day and to make certain it i functioning properly on your device.

Prospective Student Athletes:


- The NCAA Eligibility Center is responsible for certifying the academic and amateur status of all <u>Division I and II</u> student-athletes. College-bound student-athletes can create an account with the Eligibility Center by visiting www.eligibilitycenter.org.
- Prospective student athletes are recommended to create and register during junior year. Please make sure your counselor is aware of your desire to participate in athletics on a Div I or II level in college.
- NCAA no longer requires SAT/ACT scores. However, specific schools may for admission. Students are encouraged students to take at least one standardized exam
- Academic requirements for each student-athlete are based on the student's high school core -course grade point average.
- Athletic commitment does not guarantee academic admission, please continue to push academically into senior year

Common Application Essay Topics

- Some students have a background, identity, interest, or talent that is so meaningful they believe their application would be incomplete without it. If this sounds like you, then please share your story.
- 2. The lessons we take from obstacles we encounter can be fundamental to later success. Recount a time when you faced a challenge, setback, or failure. How did it affect you, and what did you learn from the experience?
- 3. Reflect on a time when you questioned or challenged a belief or idea. What prompted your thinking? What was the outcome?
- 4. Reflect on something that someone has done for you that has made you happy or thankful in a surprising way. How has this gratitude affected or motivated you?
- 5. Discuss an accomplishment, event, or realization that sparked a period of personal growth and a new understanding of yourself or others.
- 6. Describe a topic, idea, or concept you find so engaging that it makes you lose all track of time. Why does it captivate you? What or who do you turn to when you want to learn more?
- Share an essay on any topic of your choice. It can be one you've already written, one that responds to a different prompt, or one of your own design.

Make Your Social Media Work for You

The impression that you make on a college admission officer may involve more than just an essay, a transcript, and some test scores. According to new data, colleges and universities do pay attention to what prospective students post on Twitter, Facebook, Instagram, etc. In addition, potential employers for internships or permanent positions may also review your public social sites.

What your social media tells others:

*It sheds light on your interests and passions

*It may give a more in depth look at your volunteer work or special projects

*Your creativity and technology skills may be spotlighted

*It may provide evidence of your interest in a particular major, college, or career

Make the most of your social media time:

*Keep your profile information up to date

* Consider providing a link to your social media sites in your college application materials (provided the college allows/encourages this).

*Invest the time to maintain quality in your postings, blogs, and videos.

*Showcase your leadership, awards, or expertise in a meaningful manner.

Social Media Reminder:

*Review your email address to ensure it doesn't include rude or inappropriate language or references

*Carefully consider your tweets and other comments, particularly any negative references about prospective colleges, your teachers, or your peers.

*Monitor what photos you choose to post. Don't include those that may depict alcohol and certain party and peer activities that would reflect poorly on your judgment or character.

*A good rule of thumb is: **Don't put anything on social media that you wouldn't include with your college application**.
